





Beachfront Property



It's summer in Antarctica! While most penguins see a chance for fun on the beach, the Tycoon sees a business opportunity.



- The Tycoon hired 6 developers to develop the beachfront. Each lot was developed by one developer, and each developer got at least 3 lots.
- The lots were arranged in blocks of 2 or 3, as shown. No one developed 2 lots within the same block.
- The developers of lots 16 and 17 are known for appearing on TV. That is the only pair of lots within a block featuring developers that debuted in the same medium (TV, Stage, or Print).
- Multiple developers are quite young, in their teens or early twenties. The sum of each such developer's lots is an odd number.
- The developer(s) of lots 2, 6, 7, and 17 are female.
- The developer(s) of lots 4 and 15 debuted before 1900.
- The most politically savvy developer developed the most lots: 5.
- The Italian developed the lot with the pier, but fewer lots overall than the New Yorker.
- One non-human developer had all of their lots closer to the pier than any lot owned by another non-human developer.
- No one developed 2 adjacent lots, and only the developer from the UK had any lots separated by distance 2 (i.e., one other lot in between). Each of this developer's lots was distance 2 from exactly one of their other lots.
- The scariest developer developed lot 13.

After all of the developers finished work on their lots, the Tycoon ran the following numbers:

$$\begin{aligned} & 1 + 12 + 18 - 21 \\ & 2 + 3 - 16 - 22 \\ & 4 + 10 - 5 - 22 \\ & 3 + 8 - 14 - 18 \\ & 6 + 16 - 1 - 2 \\ & 11 + 22 - 2 - 14 - 19 \\ & 5 + 15 + 18 - 14 - 17 \\ & 14 + 17 - 3 - 22 \\ & 17 - 2 - 8 \\ & 9 + 20 + 22 - 13 \\ & 1 + 11 + 16 - 7 - 19 \\ & 16 + 17 - 3 - 18 \\ & 1 + 22 - 3 - 15 \\ & 5 + 18 - 4 - 6 - 14 \\ & 12 + 22 - 2 - 5 \end{aligned}$$
